At Ledyard High School he worked with Rachael Allen (past Music Director of The Shoreline Chorale) and taught Melanie Cometa, (also a past Music Director of The Shoreline Chorale).

Professionally, Russ served for many years with the American Choral Directors Association as Connecticut State President and Eastern Division Repertoire and Standards Chair for High School Choral Music. In 2004, he was named by ACDA as the outstanding Choral Director in Connecticut.

Russ holds a Bachelor of Music Education from Bradley University, a Master's in Music from the University of Connecticut, and a 6th Year degree in Educational Leadership from SCSU.

Currently, Russ is a Student Teacher Supervisor at the University of Connecticut and sings professionally with CONCORA and the Hartford Chorale. He lives in Chester with his wife Michele, where they spend time traveling and looking for trails to run.

About The Guest Artists



The Ledyard High School Chamber Choir, conducted by LHS alumna Melanie Wade Cometa, is the premier choral ensemble at Ledyard High School. This auditioned group is comprised of 20 students in grades 10-12. The group performs at dozens of events during the school year and has enjoyed success at national music competitions for many years. During the Covid-19 shutdown, the group produced dozens of virtual choir performances, which were shared all over the world, including by ChoirBuzz, The Choir Project, Billy Joel, and Sara Bareilles, and helped to raise over \$5,000 for charities and scholarships. The Ledyard High School Chamber Choir has premiered several new choral compositions, including music from Rob Dietz, Tehilla Alphonso, Jared Gravely, Shawn Kirchner, Stacey Gibbs, and Jim Papoulis. The LHS Chamber Choir was a National Finalist for the 2024 American Prize in Choral Performance.



Melanie Wade Cometa is the Director of Choral Activities at Ledyard High School, her alma mater, where she conducts over 150 students in eleven choirs. Her ensembles have performed as guest artists with CONCORA, Voce, the Mystic River Chorale, the Shoreline Chorale, and as a featured choir at ACDA state and regional conferences. Mrs. Cometa and the Ledyard High School Chamber Choir were National Finalists for the 2024 American Prize in Choral Performance. From March 2020-June 2021, Mrs. Cometa and the Ledyard Choirs produced over 50 virtual ensemble projects, including three world premieres and a feature-length virtual musical. Her work has been featured on ChoirBuzz, The Choir Project, and most recently at Carnegie Hall.

Mrs. Cometa is the President of Connecticut ACDA and is a regular clinician and guest conductor for conferences and festivals throughout the Northeast.



Resonet in Laudibus Scott Logan

Resonet in Laudibus bursts forth in celebration of Christ's birth. Drawing from the rich tradition of a 14th-century Latin hymn, this setting weaves classical elegance with contemporary vitality, capturing both the reverence and exuberance of the Christmas season.

Soaring melodies and rhythmic energy bring the text to life, as voices resound in praise—Christus natus est! Whether performed in a grand cathedral or a concert hall, Resonet in Laudibus is a stirring proclamation of joy.



Text and Translation

Resonet in laudibus! Christus natus est!
Resonet in laudibus, cum jucundis plausibus,

Fluid melodic lines depict the gentle birthing of light from light in this reverent setting of the classic Latin text. Poignant harmonies support the interwoven countermelodies, creating layers of sound that climax in the final refrain and fade into sweet reflection on the repeated phrase, "O nata lux."

Oceans and Stars Amy Bernon

In this song, the singers ask, "Friend, what will you see on your long journey? River, what adventures do you seek...?". Paralleling the voyages we make through life with those of a river to the sea, this song offers singers and listeners thoughtful questions to contemplate.

This piece is in Mixolydian mode, which means it sounds like a major scale until...surprise!...the 7th is lowered. That's why *Oceans and Stars* has no D-sharp in an otherwise E major key.

Friend, what will you see on your long journey? What will you see? River, what adventures do you seek on your swift travels to the ocean deep? What do you expect to fund so far away from home?

Friend, I'll miss you. Promise you won't be gone long.
River, on your way, sing out your greatest song!

Friends and rivers go where they must go, leaving us waiting.



Note from the Composer

I grew up on a ranch in New Mexico, and the quiet, gentle power and love of nature was something I experienced on a daily basis. One learns to "listen" to the sound of the breeze, birds in the distance, and every part of the wonder of creation. This is a work about a relationships – that no matter how small or large a task, it is more meaningful when the two people share it together.

Note from the Composer

This piece is based on the poem *The Awakening* by James Weldon Johnson (1871-1938). Johnson was a civil-rights activist, writer, composer, politician, educator, lawyer, and diplomat. He was also a leading figure in the creation and development of the Harlem Renaissance. He is best known for writing the hymn *Lift Every Voice and Sing* with his brother in 1900.

I was drawn to The Awakening because it has a powerful and moving text that I think many can relate to, especially teenagers. As I wrote it, I imagined a disoriented, dreamlike state at the beginning, where the singer identified as a beautiful, yet lonely rose that no one notices or appreciates. In the second verse, the excitement and anticipation grow as the bee approaches and responds lovingly to the rose. Now blissfully validated, the rose realizes that it was well worth the wait!

Text

I dreamed that I was a rose
That grew beside a lonely way,
Close by a path none ever chose,
And there I lingered day by day.
Beneath the sunshine and the show'r
I grew and waited there apart,
Gathering perfume hour by hour,
And storing it within my heart,
Yet, never knew,

Note from the Composer

At its core, the message of "Arise My Love" is universal: Love is love is love.

This work was commissioned by Renaissance City Women's and Men's Choirs and the Indianapolis Women's and Men's Choruses as an "anthem" to be sung at GALA Choruses Festival International, Montreal, 2004 (Gay and Lesbian Association of Choruses). The texts adapted for this piece were chosen specifically to acknowledge that all committed, loving couples seek the blessing of the larger community and desire that their union be graced by the Divine One.

A driving echoed verse bursts into a dancelike, mixed-meter refrain, brilliantly capturing the nature of Sara Teasdale's vivid poetry. Narverud's contrasting B section takes a more contemplative approach, gradually growing to a recapitulation of the spirited main chorus.

Note from the Composer

I've always loved the Scottish melody, Loch Lomond; it's just achingly beautiful. The tune rarely (ever?) is performed in a worship setting, though, since the original lyrics are all about a body of water and a soldier's plight. So I set to work crafting lyrics that I hope speak into the turbulence and challenges we face as individuals—and as a community.

On Springfield Mountain Vicki Tucker Courtney

Note from the Composer

On Springfield Mountain is one of the earliest known American ballads. It is about 21-year-old Timothy Myrick, who was bitten by a poisonous rattlesnake while mowing his father's land on Springfield Mountain, now Wilbraham, Massachusetts. The fatal bite killed him a few hours later in Farmington, Connecticut on August 7, 1761.

Songs about current news in neighboring communities were passed around and passed down as a way of communicating life events throughout America. Understandably, folk songs were known to have many different versions of lyrics and melodies. This folk song story includes his future wife, known as Sally or Molly. And while the original take was heartfelt and reverently sung, in the 1830's it developed into a song of comedy telling the death of Timothy's fiancé because of trying to suck the poison out while having a broken tooth.

Note from the Composer

2024 was a difficult year for our family; one marked by several losses. Yet, in those difficult moments, we found incredible solace in the love and care of our friends, family, coworkers, and students.
